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






March 18


Challenger: A True Story of Heroism and Disaster on the Edge of Space



Centurion Ministries, the first organization dedicated to exonerating innocent people who have been wrongly convicted. These true stories expose prevalent injustices in our criminal justice system, as well as the racism and corruption that make wrongful convictions so difficult to reverse.


I Heard Her Call My Name: A Memoir of Transition by Lucy Sante
